What is CABENUVA?

CABENUVA is a complete prescription regimen used to treat HIV-1 infection in people 12 years and older who weigh at least 77 lbs (35 kg), to replace their current HIV-1 medicines when their healthcare provider determines they meet certain requirements.




How does CABENUVA work?



It contains 2 HIV medicines, cabotegravir and rilpivirine, to help keep you undetectable.*

These 2 medicines slowly release over time to keep around the same level of medicine in your body between appointments.

To help stay undetectable, it's important to keep all planned appointments.




Target Treatment Date

What are the most common side effects?

The most common side effects reported in clinical studies were injection-site reactions.*†



75% to 83% of people experienced injection-site reactions.

Most injection-site reactions were mild to moderate and went away in about 3 days.

What are the most common side effects?

Aside from injection-site reactions, the most common side effects included:

- Fever
- Tiredness
- Headache
- Muscle or bone pain

- Nausea
- Sleep problems
- Dizziness
- Rash



How will I receive CABENUVA?

- Once a month or once every 2 months, a healthcare provider will inject CABENUVA as 2 injections (cabotegravir and rilpivirine), one into the muscle of each side of your buttocks.
- Before receiving your first CABENUVA injections, your healthcare provider may have you take 1 VOCABRIA (cabotegravir) tablet and 1 EDURANT (rilpivirine) tablet once a day for 1 month (at least 28 days) to assess how you tolerate these medicines.
- Stay under the care of a healthcare provider during CABENUVA treatment. It is important that you attend all planned injection appointments.
- If you miss or plan to miss a scheduled CABENUVA injection by more than 7 days, call your healthcare provider right away to discuss your treatment options.
- If you stop treatment with CABENUVA you will need to take other medicines to treat your HIV-1 infection and reduce the risk of developing viral resistance. Call your healthcare provider right away to discuss your treatment options.





Continuing the CABENUVA conversation

Here are a few other questions that may come up:

Q. How does CABENUVA help me stay undetectable?

A. CABENUVA combines 2 HIV medicines that control the virus in different ways. These medicines are long-acting, so they can be given once a month or every other month.

Q. What if I miss my CABENUVA injection?

A. If you miss or plan to miss your treatment appointment by more than 7 days, contact your doctor right away to discuss your treatment options to ensure you stay undetectable.

Q. Can I switch my dosing schedule if I'm already on CABENUVA?

A. If you're already on CABENUVA, you may be able to switch your dosing schedule, either to everyother-month or monthly injections. The best way to find out is to ask your doctor—they can advise you on the steps you'll need to take.

Continuing the CABENUVA conversation

Q. What can I do to help treat injection-site reactions?

A. In clinical trials, injection-site reactions* were common and most were mild to moderate. Ask your doctor what you can do to help treat symptoms like soreness or irritation you may experience from the injections.





A. Some medicines may interact with CABENUVA, so be sure to tell your doctor about all the medicines you may be taking. These include all prescription and over-the-counter medications, vitamins, and herbal supplements. Do not start taking a new medicine without telling your doctor.

Q. When can I start my long-acting regimen?

A. Before your first injections, you may take daily starter pills for about a month to see how your body reacts. Your first and second injections will be one month apart. After that, you will begin your monthly or every-other-month regimen.



Continuing the CABENUVA conversation

Q. What do I need to do before I begin taking starter pills?

- **A.** Before you begin taking your starter pills, talk to your doctor's office to confirm your next steps, including:
 - The day you stop your current HIV treatment
 - The day you begin your starter pills
 - Your first injection appointment
 - Setting up a convenient Target Treatment Date for your future injection appointments

Q. How are starter pills delivered?

A. Starter pills are delivered in a Welcome Pack to your preferred location—such as your home or your doctor's office.

Q. What are the costs for CABENUVA and how much will I pay?

A. The costs are for the treatment itself and the doctor appointments. The amount you pay out of pocket depends on your insurance coverage and if you qualify for any programs that may lower out-of-pocket costs.
